FROM THE PRESIDENT

DEAR MEMBER,

LET'S TALK ABOUT TAHARA.

In Jewish tradition, we come into the world pure and are to leave it pure. Tahara is a purification ritual for the body and soul (neshama) of the deceased. First codified in 1626, the essential form of the tahara is similar throughout the world and is performed by three to four members of the Chevra Kadisha who are the same gender as the person who has died.

After initially addressing the deceased by name, the met/meta (body) is gently washed from head to toe as corresponding verses from the Song of Songs are read. For example, as the head is washed, one recites:

His head is like the most fine gold; his heaps of curls are black as a raven.

And as the body is washed, one recites:

Her body is as polished ivory overlaid with sapphires.

Next is the pouring of purification water over the body, preceded by a quote from Rabbi Akiva, which includes the following:

And I will pour upon you pure water and you will be purified of all your defilements and from all your abominations I will purify you.

Using pitchers, water is poured in a continuous stream over the entire body, while simultaneously saying, tahora hee (she is pure) or tahora hoo (he is pure). The met/meta is then carefully dried with cloth and, following a concluding prayer, is ready to be dressed in the ritual garments.

It is simple, it is beautiful, and it is said to be the greatest mitzvah of all because one can never be thanked by the recipient.

Etz Chayim members have always played an important role in the Toledo Jewish Community's Chevra Kadisha, sacred burial society. We want to perpetuate that opportunity for our members, and/or the children, nieces, nephews, or friends of our members. Simply, as members of the Chevra Kadisha move on, it is important for new members to take their place.

Give it some thought. It is the greatest mitzvah of all and the benefit is as immeasurable as the mitzvah itself.

Yes, LET'S TALK ABOUT TAHARA.

Pesach is the oldest and most transformative story of hope ever told.

It tells of how an otherwise undistinguished group of slaves found their way to freedom from the greatest and longest-lived empire of their time, indeed of any time.

It tells the revolutionary story of how the supreme Power intervened in history to liberate the supremely powerless.

It is a story of the defeat of probability by the force of possibility.

It defines what it is to be a Jew: a living symbol of hope.

The Exodus is the inexhaustible source of inspiration to all those who long for Freedom. It taught that right was sovereign over might; that freedom and justice Must belong to all, not some; that under God, all human beings are equal; and That over all earthly powers is the supreme power, the King of Kings, who hears The cry of the oppressed and who intervenes in history to liberates slaves.

It took many centuries for this vision to become the shared property of liberal Democracies of the West; and there is no guarantee that it will remain so.

Freedom is a moral achievement, and without a constant effort of education it atrophies and must be fought for again.

Nowhere more than on Pesach, though, do we see how, loyal to its faith across the centuries, the Jewish people became the guardians of a vision through which, ultimately, "all the nations of the earth will be blessed."

ARRANGEMENTS HAVE BEEN MADE WITH CONGREGATION B'NAI ISRAEL & CHABAD FOR SALE OF CHAMETZ. THE APPROPRIATE FORMS FOR EACH ARE INCLUDED IN THIS HASHOMER. PLEASE CONTACT B'NAI ISRAEL OR CHABAD DIRECTLY WITH ANY QUESTIONS.

<u>Ma'os Chitim</u>: Because of the great expense in purchasing the wine, matzah, and kosher for Passover food necessary for a proper observance of the holiday, charity is collected in the weeks prior to Pesach for the specific purpose of helping those who have a difficult time meeting these expenses. This campaign is traditionally referred to as "Ma'os Chitim," literally, "Money for Wheat," referring to the high cost involved in properly tending to the wheat so that it may be turned into matzah. We will be collecting money to be distributed to the JFS Food Pantry. Please make checks payable to "Congregation Etz Chayim," and include "Ma'os Chitim" in the memo. If you are in need of financial assistance in properly preparing for the holiday, please contact Jewish Family Service.

<u>Prohibition of Chametz</u>: Chametz is defined as any product made of the five grains—wheat, barley, oats, spelt, and rye—which has been given an opportunity to leaven. In addition to the prohibition against eating these foods, the Torah forbids even owning such products on Pesach. To ensure that no chametz be in our possession during the entire duration of the holiday, a number of practices are put into place: Bedikas Chametz, Bitul Chametz, and Mechiras Chametz (see below). As a practical matter, only items that bear proper "Kosher for Passover" certification should be eaten on Passover. Due to the complexities of industrial food production, items cannot be deemed kosher for Passover simply by analyzing the printed ingredients.

<u>Prohibition of Kitniyos</u>: The long-standing tradition amongst Ashkenazic Jews has been to refrain from eating "kitniyos" on Pesach. Though literally translated as "legumes," in the context of Pesach, the term includes a litany of other items that could be confused for genuine grains. Examples include corn, peanuts, beans, peas, mustard seed, and soy, as well as any of their derivatives, such as corn syrup, peanut butter, and tofu. As mentioned in regards to chametz, only foods that bear proper "Kosher for Passover" certification should be utilized during the holiday.

<u>Bedikas Chametz</u>: In order to ensure that chametz has been completely eradicated from our homes prior to the onset of Pesach, the Sages enacted the practice of "Bedikas Chametz," or "Searching for Chametz," to be done after nightfall on the eve of Pesach. The Sages called for this to be done specifically at night because of the ability to detect smaller crumbs in the nooks and crannies of the home by candlelight at night than by sunlight during the day. Any areas of the home which cannot be safely checked by candlelight should be examined with a flashlight. Bedikas Chametz should be performed this year on Thursday night, April 10 p.m. after 8:50 p.m. Following Bedikas Chametz, the appropriate Nullification of Chametz should be recited (see Bitul Chametz, below.)

Bitul Chametz." As a safety measure to ensure that no chametz is left in our possession over Pesach, "Bitul Chametz," or, "The Nullification of Chametz" is performed. This is a verbal declaration whereby the owner removes all ownership over any chametz that may still be left in his possession. This declaration is made twice, each with a slightly variant text from the other. The first declaration is made following Bedikas Chametz (see above). In this declaration, we nullify all that we have not found and are unaware of, but retain ownership over chametz which we are aware of. This exclusion is made so as to still retain ownership over the chametz which we will burn the following morning at Bi'ur Chametz (see next page). The second declaration is made following the burning of the chametz on the morning before Passover. In this declaration, we remove ownership from any and all chametz which may still be in our possession. The text for each declaration can be found in any standard Haggadah. Because this is a legal declaration, it is imperative that the meaning of the declaration be understood in its entirety. As such, the declaration should be recited in English, and may then be repeated in the original Aramaic if desired.

Bi'ur Chametz: Literally, "The Destruction of the Chametz." Destroying chametz is an independent mitzvah commanded by the Torah, apart from the overarching need to rid one's home of chametz. This mitzvah can only be performed with chametz that we still own. It is for this reason that the Nullification of Chametz recited this year on Thursday evening, April 10, following our search for the chametz (see Bedikas Chametz on previous page) was limited only to that chametz which went unfound and of which we were unaware. We make a point of retaining ownership over the chametz which we are aware of so that we will be able to actively destroy it the next morning in fulfillment of this Biblical mitzvah. We make a point of burning the chametz, as opposed to destroying it through some other means, in order to fulfill the mitzvah according to R' Yehudah, whose opinion as stated in the Mishnah is that burning the chametz is the only manner in which this mitzvah may be fulfilled. The remaining chametz should be eaten before 12:15 p.m. and sold and burned before 12:23 p.m. on Friday, April 11, and no chametz should be eaten afterward until the closing of Pesach.


Mechiras Chametz: Chametz that the owner does not wish to destroy before Pesach may be sold to a gentile. To effect this sale, the rabbi is given "power of attorney" over a person's chametz and then sells it to a gentile on the owner's behalf on the morning before Pesach.

PLEASE NOTE: The sale of the chametz is a binding legal transaction. The utilization of this chametz while it still belongs to the gentile is an act of theft. Please take care to leave the chametz aside until 9:30 p.m. on Sunday night, April 20, at which point the rabbi will have re-purchased the chametz for all its original owners.

Start of the Seder

In an ideal situation, the seder is not started until nightfall, which coincides with 8:52 p.m. on the night of the first Seder, Saturday, April 12, and 8:54 p.m. on the night of the second Seder, Sunday, April 13. Great care should be taken to recite the Kiddush and begin the Seder only after this time. With the understanding that such a late start time makes it difficult to enjoy a protracted Seder, below are some suggestions to streamline the Seder and keep it from becoming unnecessarily drawn out.

- Station Matzah, Marror, and other Seder Plate items throughout the table. Participants can take for themselves rather than the Seder Leader passing the portions all around the table.
- Remember that analyzing and conversing about the Haggadah can continue to take place even after it has been read and everyone is enjoying dinner. Consider streamlining things by capping the number of thoughts that each participant may share while the Haggadah is read and waiting until dinner to continue the conversation.
- If younger children are the motivation to start the Seder early, consider a pre-Seder for them. Sit down with them before the Seder officially begins, have them eat dinner, hear the thoughts and songs they've learned at religious school and want to share with their family. They can fall asleep even before the Seder begins, having already been given important holiday memories.




