A Message from the
PRESIDENT

Dear Congregant,

Frigid is the weather. Frigid has been the weather. And only G-d knows how long this frigidity will last. At first, we used it as a reason to stay at home, snuggle with a good book or television or a game, eat hot soup and other comfort foods . . . but after a while, that got old and we stepped outside, yearning for fresh air. What mattered was the joy of breathing and feeling the fresh air, of exchanging smiles with strangers at the grocery store, and feeling so fortunate to be able to go back to life as we like to live it. After so long, many decided that cold was not going to determine our actions; we just had to be better dressed for it.

Last month, when Rabbi Mark was cancelled due to inclement weather, I listened to Rabbi Adam Raskin as I streamed services from Maryland. The rabbi spoke of Passover, of the requirement to put blood on the doorpost so the angel of death would pass over those houses that did so. What I did not remember hearing before was that the blood was inside the door. If G-d could create the entire world in six days, certainly His angel of death had the ability to know which houses were the homes of the Jews. Why the blood inside? It was for us, for us when we were slaves in Egypt, when we sat at our first Passover tables. It was important for us to look at it, to recognize that we had taken an active part in putting it there. We were participating in this Exodus. We chose to do so. We were taking charge of our lives.

After Shabbos, we were privileged to read Rabbi Mark's sermon which had been emailed to us. Jason referred to Viktor Frankl's message about the human drive to make meaning of our lives, the fact that "while we do not control what happens to us, we do retain the freedom to choose how we respond and what meaning we allow those events to carry." Rabbi Mark's message was encouraging and comforting. What Jason said is, "To be proactive in shaping the stories of our lives demands that we recognize our own agency. The fact that even amidst the most painful moments, we reserve some measure of power to determine what these moments will mean for us. "

I have just begun reading Zack Bodner's book entitled, *Why Do Jewish*, an interesting look into the concept that although being Jewish is not a choice for most of us, "doing" Jewish is. Consistent with Rabbi Mark's message, consistent with Rabbi Raskin's message, the choices we make in our daily lives reflect our connection with Jewish traditions and values. At Etz Chayim, within the congregational activities, we "do" Jewish by attending Wednesday night minyanim. We "do" Jewish by attending Shabbat services when the rabbi is here, by attending Shabbat dinners and services and kiddush luncheons; we do Jewish through other synagogue activities, by volunteering in any way at the synagogue, by participating in Sisterhood programs, in outreach to the greater community through organized Etz Chayim outreach. We "do" Jewish by attending programs sponsored by the Federation as well as programs by other synagogues and other agencies in the community. And as we "do" Jewish, we strengthen our synagogue, our community, and we strengthen ourselves.

The Federation is working hard to strengthen our community by consolidating many activities, while at the same time respecting the values and traditions of each congregation. A couple areas in which they are looking for representation from each synagogue is the Film Festival Committee and the Jewish Book Fair committee. Are you interested in "doing" Jewish that way? If so, please call me so that I can submit your name. I would love to have you represent us.

Tikun Olam teaches us that we are to work to repair the world. What we know as well is that as we participate in doing so, we give strength, purpose and fulfillment to ourselves. Each time we reach out and give of ourselves, the return is manyfold.

Last month we co-sponsored a Tu B'Shevat seder with B'nai Israel. Over seventy participants enjoyed the rituals and the teachings by Rabbi Marsh. The coming month will see many delightful activities at our shul, including the Kishka Dinner, the Book Club meeting, and Shabbat with our rabbi. It will also include Purim with B'nai Israel at our shul, Shalach Manot bags by our Sisterhood, Etz Chayim's hamantaschen sale, and a Federation Purim Carnival at the Temple which is open to the community.

I look forward to being with you as we "do" Jewish in the activities of our choice.

God's Hidden Call - A Thought about Purim

Following are excerpts from this article; it can be found in entirety online.

The Book of Esther . . . comes from an almost secularized world, where we search for the presence of God in history and we fail to find it. Yet there is one line in the *megillah* that cuts through me like a knife and represents the most powerful statement in Judaism I know that Hashem has not abandoned us.

Towards the end of the fourth chapter, we find Esther telling her uncle Mordechai about all the problems there might be in interceding with King Achashverosh regarding the fate of the Jewish people. Mordechai listens and then responds to her with the famous words, *Im haharash tachrishi, ba'et hazot revach v'hatzla ya'amod layehudim mimakom acher*, "If you are silent and you do nothing at this time somebody else will save the Jewish people." *U'mi yodeia im l'et kazot, higa'at lamalchut?* "But who knows, was it not for just this moment that you became a Queen, with access to King Achashverosh in the royal palace?"

This, for me, is the ultimate statement of *hashgacha pratit*, that wherever we are, sometimes Hashem is asking us to realize why He put us here, with these gifts, at this time, with these dangers, in this place. *Hashgacha pratit* is our fundamental belief that God never abandons us, that He puts us here with something to do. Even in the worst hiding of God, if you listen hard enough, you can hear Him calling to us as individuals, saying *U'mi yodeia im l'et kazot higa'at lamalchut?* "Was is not for this very challenge that you are here in this place at this time?"

In the third chapter of *Hilchot Teshuva, The Laws of Repentance*, Rambam teaches us how throughout the entire year, we should see ourselves as if we as individuals and the entire world collectively are evenly poised between merit and sin. Our next deed may tilt the balance of our life, it may tilt the balance of somebody else's life, it may even tilt the balance of the world. We never know when an act of ours will have consequences. Did Esther, growing up with Mordechai, know that one day, the entire future of the Jewish people will rest with her? You never know what significance one friendship or one little moment might have for you and for somebody else that might just change the world.

You don't have to change the world to change the world. Let me explain. If we really believe, as the Mishna in Sandedrin, says *Nefesh achat k'olam malei*, that "A life is like a universe" then if you change one life, you can begin to change the universe the only way any of us can, one life at a time, one day at a time, one act at a time.
